


# IOM APPEALS FOR USD 119 MILLION FOR ROHINGYA REFUGEE RESPONSE IN BANGLADESH

The International Organization for Migration announced its appeal of USD 119 million to support nearly a million Rohingya refugees in the world's largest refugee settlement in Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, and the vulnerable community generously hosting them. IOM's Appeal is part of the joint response plan for the Rohingya Humanitarian Crisis which seeks to raise USD 852.4 million to reach 1.35 million people with the support of 117 partners. The JRP was launched on 13 March in Geneva by UNHCR and IOM who co-lead the Rohingya Humanitarian Response in Bangladesh, under the overall leadership of the Government of Bangladesh.

Building on the efforts and success of previous years, IOM's Appeal aims to ensure the continued provision of much-needed humanitarian assistance for Rohingya refugees. This includes shelter, basic household items, health care, water and sanitation, and protection services. Since the massive Rohingya influx in 2017, nearly a million Rohingya refugees have sought temporary refuge in Cox's Bazar. The Government of Bangladesh and the international community have provided humanitarian assistance over this period, however, ongoing commitment is critical until the refugees can voluntarily return to Myanmar in a safe and dignified manner.

In 2024, IOM will continue to provide a wide ranging humanitarian assistance and protection services to Rohingya refugees, while also providing aid and assistance to the most vulnerable members of the host community.



UNDP's Goodwill Ambassador and HRH Crown Princess Victoria of Sweden paid a visit to the IOM-run Rohingya Cultural Memory Centre.

Delegations from Australia, Government of Bangladesh and Indonesia came to see the IOM-run Rohingya Cultural Memory Centre.

A five-member delegation from the Embassy of Switzerland to Myanmar explored the IOM-run Rohingya Cultural Memory Centre and visited one of IOM's Women and Girls Safe Spaces.

A five-member delegation from European Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations visited the fire response by IOM in Camp 11 as well as the IOM-run Rohingya Cultural Memory Centre.

A four-member delegation from the Global Affairs Canada Mission explored the IOM-run Rohingya Cultural Memory Centre and visited one of the IOM's Women and Girls Safe Spaces. They also explored IOM's social cohesion interventions in Cox's Bazar.

A two-member delegation from KFW Monitoring Team came to see IOM's water, sanitation and hygiene and site development works in the Rohingya camps.
